Like the buds and bees, we have a busy month planned at the library. As you read through this issue of our newsletter, you will find many events and services to take advantage of and enjoy. Of note on the technology front, we will begin loaning out **iPads** for use in the library for 2 hour slots, and if you haven't seen them yet, the two 27-inch **iMacs** are not only functional but gorgeous. Both the iPads and iMacs were generously provided by the Goodnow Library Foundation.

We are particularly proud to announce a new collection: **Kindles**. On April 1, 20 Kindles will be available for check out. Five will be loaded with the hottest young adult fiction available. Five more will have a selection of favorite children's books. For adults, we have loaded up two Kindles with the very popular "Librarian's Choice" collection to match and complement the print collection. All things renew. All things begin. At church, they bring The lilies in.







Interlibrary Loans at Your Library

The Virtual Catalog is currently unavailable for direct requests. In the coming months, both the Minuteman system and the statewide Virtual Catalog system will undergo software upgrades. This requires the suspension of direct Virtual Catalog requests until all of the new Virtual Catalog functions are in place.

During this time if you need items that are not available within the Minuteman Network, you may request them in person at the Reference Desk, by telephone at 978-440-5524 with the Interlibrary Loan Department, or by filling out <u>the online request</u>.

When using the online request form, fill out as much information as possible about the item you want. Your request will be processed by the Interlibrary Loan Department. If there are questions about your request, you will be contacted by telephone or email. You will be contacted as soon as the item you requested has arrived. If we are unable to obtain the item you requested, you will also be notified. Looking for Fun Apps for Kids?

Children's App Review: Endless Alphabet by Callaway Digital Arts

\$6.99 in iTunes Store, iPad and iPhone

If it was possible to have a fun AND educational app, the guys at Callaway Digital Arts, have done it. Endless Alphabet is amazing from start to finish and is something kids (and adults) of all ages can enjoy.

The concept of the app is basic: spelling new vocabulary words while learning phonetic sounds of letters. The app opens to reveal a long list of words accompanied by adorable illustrations with monster actors (the list of words grows over time). Once you select a word, the letters scramble all over a new screen, with an outline of each letter in the word. Touch a letter to hear the phonetic sound ("B" is "buhhh, buhhh", etc.) and then drag it to the appropriate spot in the word. Once all of the letters are matched in the correct places, the player is met with a round of applause and a cute, clever definition of the word read and acted out for them. Players can take as long as they like to spell a word and there are not any "scores" kept in this app.

Overall, this app, while more expensive than others like it, encourages learning, creativity and early literacy in a remarkably fun and easy environment. A must buy for any tech savvy family!

Charlie graduated from Syracuse University, class of 1961, with a Bachelor's Degree in Industrial Design. After graduating from college, Charlie served as First Lieutenant in the U.S. Army. He was Vice President of GUNN DESIGN in Boston, Massachusetts where he headed their Industrial Design Department. Charlie founded and was President of INOV8 DESIGN of West Concord, Massachusetts. Charlie was awarded the HATCH AWARD for design by the Boston Design Council and his designs have appeared in INDUSTRIAL DESIGN magazine. Charlie holds various design patents in technology product development specializing in medical devices and industrial instrumentation. Charlie is a member of the Industrial Design Society of America, the Hollis Art Association, the Sudbury Art Society, and the River's Edge Arts Alliance. His paintings are in collections in Canada, California Florida, New Hampshire, Maine, Vermont, Massachusetts, and New York. Charlie is a juried artist and his flower art work can be purchased at the Tower Hill Botanic Garden gift shop in Boylston, Massachusetts. "Form follows function" is a principle of industrial design. As a designer Charlie has tried to adhere to this truth in his work. As an artist, Charlie sees this truth and beauty in the realistic natural world.






