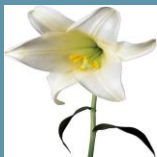

The way this winter has been going, who isn't looking forward to March and the official start of spring (in name, if not spirit)? We have several exciting events coming up that I want to share with you.

Kicking off the Local Luminaries Series

Sudbury has so many talented writers, illustrators and literary figures that we wanted to create a series to celebrate them. So, with major assistance from the Friends of the Goodnow Library—Lela Digenis in particular—we have launched the “Local Luminaries Series,” which kicked off in February as both a celebration of a local luminary and of Black History Month. Bill Miles, retired LSRHS teacher, presented his award-winning documentary *Invisible Soldiers: unheard voices* and a lively Q&A session following it. In March, we continue with two amazing programs you won't want to miss.

Sunday, March 2, 3:00pm

Conversations on the culture and family heritage of Greece will feature Sara Cohen and Dmitri Spiliakos. Cohen, a Greek Jewish woman born in Athens to parents who survived the Holocaust. Ms. Cohen created and produced two documentaries about her culture, sharing survival stories of her relatives in their Jewish neighborhood in Greece. Mr. Spiliakos will share his stories of courage and inspiration about his grandfather, who, throughout the course of World War II, helped several Jewish families escape to Athens and

arranged for continued assistance that kept them safe during the German Occupation.

Sunday, March 9, 3:00pm

Explore collaborations between synthetic biology, art and design with LSRHS grad, Christina Agapakis. The multi-talented Agapakis is an interdisciplinary biologist, writer, educator and artist. If her field of study sounds a little exotic, it is! In her talk for a non-technical audience, Dr. Agapakis will discuss some of the art, science and technology in microbiology that is helping us see microbes in new and unexpected ways.

We continue with our series in April, so check our website for more information.

Goodnow Celebrates Sudbury's 375th

"The Bookies" Book Discussion Group



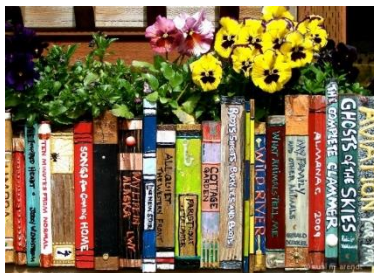

March in the McQueen Gallery: Elizabeth Swallow

Organic forms and patterns found in nature are the inspirations for Elizabeth Swallow's artwork. She reveals their innate beauty through her sculpture, painting, printmaking and digital photography. Elizabeth experiments with various color combinations creating natural objects with an inorganic or dream-like appearance. By enhancing the pigments in wood grain she exposes their overlooked beauty to the viewers. She uses clay and plaster casts to form shapes and surfaces influenced by nature, and then she embellishes them with unnatural colors and man-made objects. Animals are also common subjects of her art work and are presented in each type of medium she uses. Elizabeth's work has been shown in Worcester, Ma at the ArtsWorcester's Aurora gallery and the D'Zian art gallery.

Elizabeth studied fashion design and fine arts at Framingham State University and the Institute of Lorenzo De'Medici in Florence, Italy. She developed her interest in sculpture, digital photography and exploring the various forms of printmaking while taking classes at the Worcester Art Museum. She has recently completed courses in woodworking and bronze casting at the Rhode Island School of Design and is currently enrolled in their Jewelry and Light Metals Certificate program. Elizabeth has been a member of Worcester's Genesis Club for the past five years. They have helped her realize that through her artistic creativity she can embrace living with a mental illness and strive to achieve her goals in life.

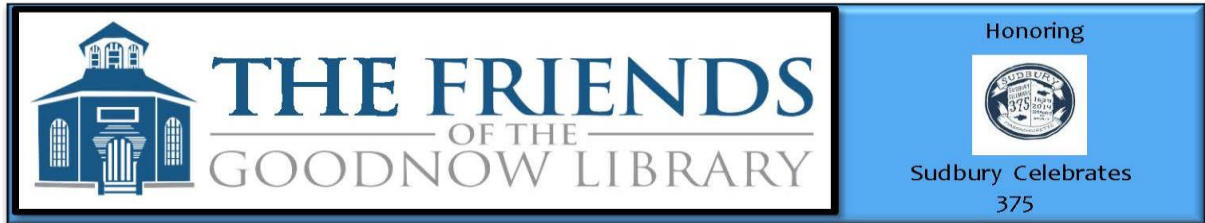
