SAME GREAT LIBRARY. NEW LOOK!

The Goodnow Library is pleased to announce a “brand”-new logo to the community today—as you can see in our new masthead above. As part of its goal to transform into a 21st century-ready institution, the Library Trustees and myself embarked on a project to design a new logo that would reflect all aspects of Goodnow, its place within the Sudbury community, and its goals for the future. The logo is the first step in our plan to redesign the Library’s website, create a mobile app, and celebrate its sesquicentennial. We are working hard to help to raise the profile of the institution and its offerings with residents, patrons, other town departments, schools, the Friends and Foundation, other libraries, newcomers and staff.

We sought to evoke an accessible, inviting, friendly, and smart tone with the logo. We worked to project an understanding of Goodnow as a contemporary institution that understands the changing needs of its patrons and has its eye on the future. Because the institution’s history is long and revered, it was important to us to create something that illustrates the Library’s forward-looking approach while being built on the shoulders of the past.


Goodnow is more accessible than ever before as it evolves to meet its patrons needs and interests. With more Internet access, e-books, as well as a focus on early

literacy and digital Library programming, the Goodnow Library is serving a larger, growing role in the community. The logo uses the classic font, Copperplate, to acknowledge the long history of the Library, with a modern treatment of intertwining the “O”s in *Goodnow*, on a simple, pale blue circle. The interlocking letters demonstrate the Library’s connection with the community and the clean and symmetrical circle on which the letters are placed have a modern, forward-looking feel.

The implementation of new logo is also part of our plans to hold a yearlong sesquicentennial celebration, and a separate but related logo and tagline has also been developed for that purpose. Beginning in April, the Library will have new book bags and other merchandise featuring the new logo, as well as the Sesquicentennial (150th) themed logo. Library cards featuring the new logo will be available later in the year to kick off “Library Card Sign-up Month” in September.

The "Bookies" will discuss **The Daughter of Time** by Josephine Tey, first published in 1951. (Copies are available at the library. If you are interested in purchasing a copy from Amazon, please use [this link](#).) We will meet on **Tuesday, February 26 at 7 pm**. This honored mystery classic should be an easy gamble. Any newcomers are more than welcome to the table.

Here is a brief overview of the next title: *When Scotland Yard Inspector Alan Grant is confined to a hospital bed, a friend brings him an assortment of pictures of famous historical figures. Grant is captivated by a portrait of King Richard III and wonders how such a sensitive-appearing soul could have murdered his own nephews to secure the British crown for himself. Grant reconsiders 500-year-old evidence pertaining to one of the most intriguing mysteries of all time. Who really killed the princes in the Tower of London? Josephine Tey's answer to this question has fascinated readers since the book's publication in 1951. This classic mystery has been ranked fourth by the Mystery Writers of America on its list of the Top 100 Mystery Novels of All Time. (Review from the Austin-American Statesman.)*

At our last meeting we reviewed **The Buddha in the Attic** by Julie Otsuka. The Buddha definitely got out of the attic as we more than serenely discussed its merits. Overall, most loved the spare storytelling of Japanese women immigrating to the United States as mail order brides after the turn of the 20th century.

Finally, her work has been on display in a number of local galleries and exhibitions.

Bayda is an instructor of youth art classes, dance and free movement at the Worcester Art Museum. She also teaches yoga and literacy and is a coordinator of **Silk Road Art Guild**, promoting Middle Eastern and Oriental art.

Would you be willing to assist the library in sorting and shelving its incoming materials delivery? We are looking for someone with basic computer skills, good organizational skills, and an interest in helping us serve the public in a vital way. The process takes about 3-4 hours start to finish, from the point when our delivery arrives on Fridays (usually between 11:30 and 12:30), and involves the following: emptying bins of library materials (usually between 10 and 20 bins) onto carts,

processing materials which have been reserved by Sudbury library patrons, and filing all of these alphabetically on our reserve shelves. There is some standing, sitting, and moving of loaded, wheeled carts involved. Staff will train, and are available throughout the process to answer questions

NEW FEATURE: MOBILE APP REVIEWS FOR YOU

Devices: iPhone, Android, BlackBerry, Windows Phone



"I have so many store cards in my wallet, I don't have room for my library card!" We've heard versions of this hundreds of times. Most of us have uttered these or similar words ourselves. So, when KeyRing came out with their app, it was like a miracle to me. I scanned all my cards and threw most of them in the trash. Ah, finally, a wallet like I used to have: driver's license, credit card, and a few bills.

I quickly regretted the rashness of my wallet spring cleaning. While KeyRing is extremely convenient for many purposes, it is not a cure-all replacement for all your cards.

Pros: creates a scannable picture of any store card with a barcode, allows you to type in non-barcoded numbers to show to places that type it in, lets you create an account so your information is backed up in "the cloud" (online storage) in case something happens to your phone, and occasionally offers you exclusive coupons.

Cons: Any place that uses their card for any sort of secure purpose will not accept this app. Why? If the app was accepted without ID, anyone could type in a random number and present it at the library, check out a bunch of DVDs, and leave the owner of the real card to pay the replacement bill. We have to refuse the app for your own protection. Anywhere you have to pay for the card, such as a bulk discount store, will refuse it too, because they lose money if you share it with your friends. Additionally, some stores have out of date scanners that can't read the barcode off the card. Another disadvantage is if your battery dies while you're shopping, you don't have access to your cards.

Overall: I'd recommend this app. Even though you can't use it for everything, it will significantly decrease your wallet size, leaving you room for the cards that actually matter, like your library card. You also can store your card number for your own use, to look it up when you're logging in online.

Recommended at 3.5 out of 4 stars.

[AVG: Antivirus Guard Free](#)

Device: Android



This is the most important app for your smart phone. Most people aren't used to thinking of a phone as being something you need a virus scanner for. Smart phones surf the internet, download and install apps, open emails and open links from SMS messages. This app protects your phone against the increasingly numerous malware programs designed to attack your phone and cause damage or even hijack it to make purchases billed to your cell phone provider. AVG is free and quick to download.

Pros: Free, a quick download, and protects your phone against viruses.

Cons: Currently only available for Android, while scanning it slows down all other programs, and it causes your battery to drain faster.

Overall: I cannot more highly recommend this. You can disable it temporarily if you need to conserve battery, but should always have your phone protected against viruses.

Recommended at 4 out of 4 stars.




